Subject: Policy regarding Drainage/Water Running on Roads

The Roads and Transportation Strategic Policy Committee has developed the attached policy during 2012. Drainage / Water running onto roads from land.

1. Introduction

Over a number of years Council Members have highlighted the need to address water flowing on roads at specific locations around the network. There are two principal reasons for this.

Most local and many regional and national roads have a limited road base comprising unbound stone on which a surface dressing of bitumen binder and chips is placed. The road base provides the structural layer which transfers the load from wheels to the underlying soil. When this becomes saturated the strength of this layer is reduced. Additionally in winter the cycle of freezing and thawing of saturated materials weakens the layer as well as damaging the surface dressing.

Secondly when water ponds on the road and freezes or when water and soil is left on the road this can present a driver with slippery conditions.

Given these items it is important that water flowing onto, or being prevented from flowing off, roads is minimised.

Land and property owners have responsibilities which are set out in the Roads Act. This discussion paper set out the legal responsibilities of land owners and occupiers, the Council's proposed policy in relation to water entering onto the public road and actions it is proposed to take in support of the policy for discussion by the Roads SPC.

2. Roads Act:

Section 76 of the Roads Act 1993 requires owners or occupier of any land adjacent to a public road to take all reasonable steps to ensure that:

(a) water is not prevented, obstructed or impeded from draining into, onto, under, through or to his land from a public road,

(b) water, soil or other material is prevented from flowing or falling onto a public road from his land.

Where, in the opinion of the Local Authority, a person is not taking these reasonable steps it may serve a notice in requiring them to carry out specified works or take specified measures—

The person may appeal the notice to the District Court on specified grounds and the court may confirm the notice unconditionally, or confirm or reject the notice subject to such modifications etc alterations or additions as the Court thinks reasonable. There is no appeal process and an owner or occupier who fails to comply with a notice shall be guilty of an offence.

Where the Council considers that the water etc. presents an immediate and serious hazard to persons using a public road or has caused, is causing or will cause serious damage to a public road it may take immediate action and recover costs from the land or property owner.

Separately a person who scours, deepens, widens or fills in any existing drain or excavates any new drain within 15m of a road or who or carries out any works which interfere with, a bridge, culvert, retaining wall, embankment or other structure providing lateral or other support for a public road must get the consent of the Council.

3. Proposed Policy of Donegal County Council:

The following is the proposed policy of the Council in relation to water entering onto roads.

It is the policy of Donegal County Council that land and property owners should be encouraged in the first instance to comply with their responsibilities to take all reasonable steps to ensure that:

- (a) water is not prevented, obstructed or impeded from draining into, onto, under, through or to their land from a public road,
- (b) water, soil or other material is prevented from flowing or falling onto a public road from their land.

Where in the opinion of the Council a land or property owner fails to comply with their responsibilities the Council may take legal action against the land or property owner concerned and recover their cost in doing so in accordance with the law.

4. Proposed actions to be taken in support of the Policy:

Landowners and occupiers of land adjacent to a public road are reminded that when they carry out drainage works within 15 metres of a public road or do other construction works which may interfere with the road, consent from the Local Authority is required.

Donegal County Council reminds landowners and occupiers of land that they are responsible for ensuring water is prevented from flowing onto roads from their land.

Checking and fixing drains on your property and ensuring you complete works on your planning permission will help you comply with your responsibilities. If you are unsure how to undertake the works please contact you local Public Service Centre who can provide advice.
